# Login


## 1.1 Login

The login methods for the AP in different modes are different. Select one of the following situations to perform.

- **When you log in to the web UI at the first time or after the AP is reset to factory settings, follow the steps below:**

**Step 1** Connect a computer to the LAN1 port of the AP using an Ethernet cable, and power it on using the included power adapter.

**Step 2** Start a web browser on the computer, and visit **192.168.0.254**. Enter your user name and password (both are **admin** by default), and click **Login**.

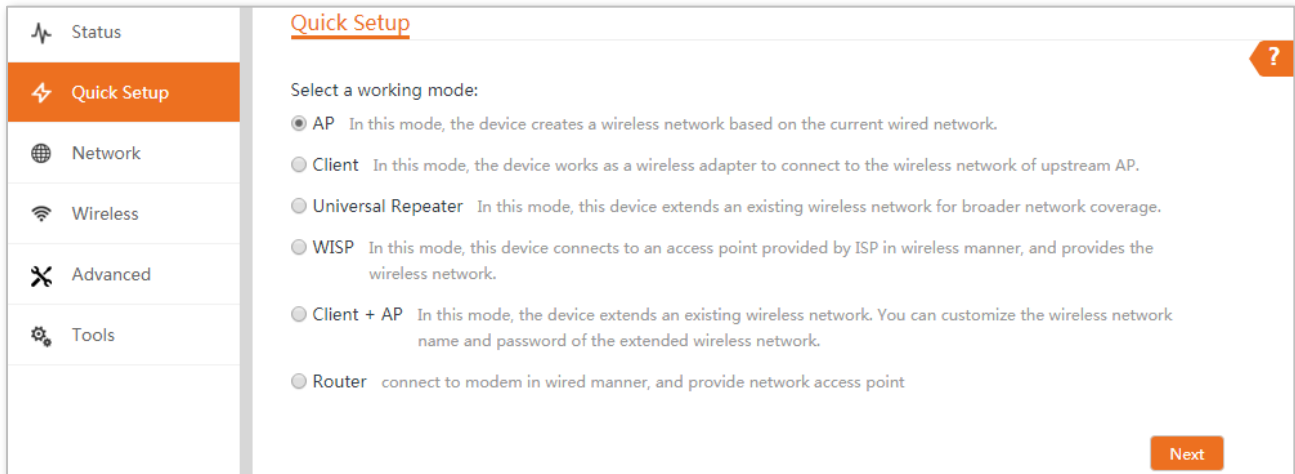

**TIP** For the security of your network, you can change the login user name and password by choosing **Tools > Account**.

- **If you want to log in to the AP in AP mode, perform the following procedure.**

**Step 1** Connect a computer to the LAN1 port of the AP using an Ethernet cable.

**Step 2** Set the IP address of the computer to **192.168.0.X** (X ranges from 1 to 253), and subnet mask to **255.255.255.0**.

**Step 3** Start a web browser on the computer, and visit **192.168.0.254**. Enter your user name and password you set, and click **Login**.

- **If you want to log in to the AP in Client mode, Universal Repeater mode, or Client + AP mode, perform the following procedure.**

**Step 1** Connect a computer to the LAN1 port of the AP using an Ethernet cable.

**Step 2** Start a web browser on the computer, and visit the IP address of the AP you set before. Enter your user name and password you set, and click **Login**.



If you forget the IP address you set for the AP, you can log in to the web UI of the upstream AP and check its DHCP client list.

- **If you want to log in to the AP in Router mode or WISP mode, perform the following procedure.**

**Step 1** Connect a computer to the LAN1 port of the AP using an Ethernet cable.

**Step 2** Start a web browser on the computer, and visit the IP address of the AP you set before. Enter your user name and password you set, and click **Login**.



If you forget the IP address you set for the AP, you check the gateway IP address of the computer, and use this IP address for login.

## 1.2 Logout

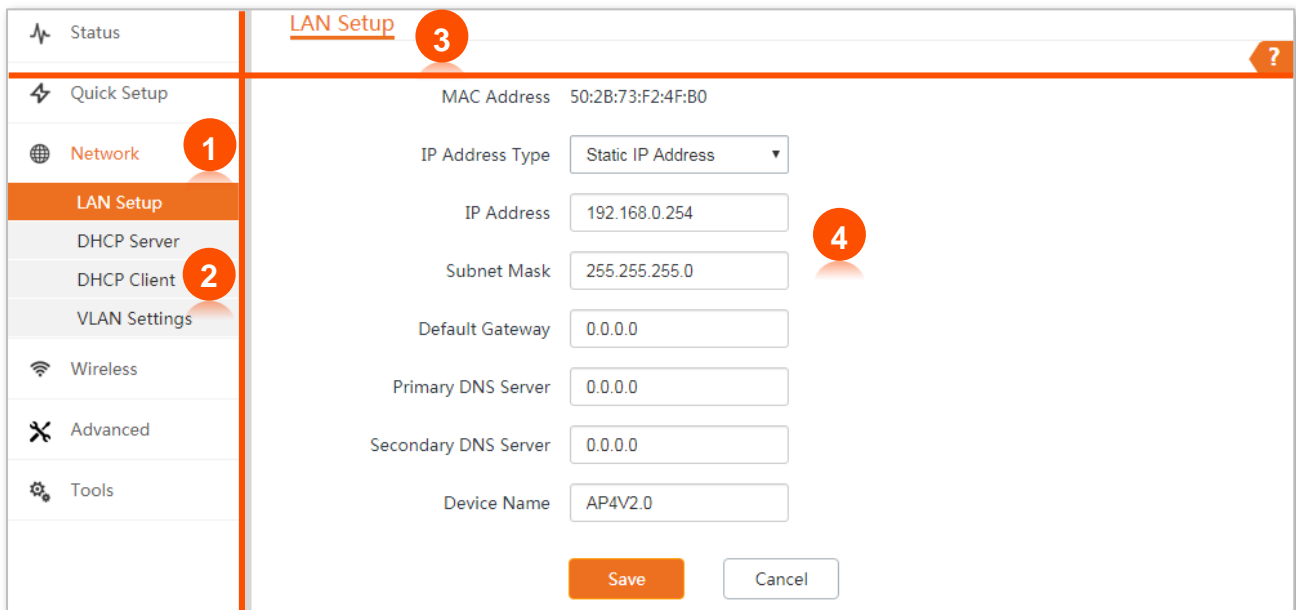
The AP logs you out when you:

- Click the **Logout** button on the upper-right corner of the web UI.
- Close the web browser.
- Perform no operation within the [login timeout interval](#) (default: 5 minutes). You can change the login timeout interval on the **Advanced > Network Service** page.

# 2 Web UI

## 2.1 Web UI layout





The web UI of the device is composed of 4 parts, including the level-1 navigation tree, level-2 navigation tree, tab page area, and configuration area. See the following figure.



No.	Name	Description
1	Level-1 navigation tree	
2	Level-2 navigation tree	The navigation bars and tab pages display the function menu of the device. When you select a function in navigation bar, the configuration of the function appears in the configuration area.
3	Tab page area	
4	Configuration area	It enables you to view and modify configuration.

## 2.2 Common buttons

The following table describes the common buttons available on the web UI.


This module includes three parts: [system status](#), [wireless status](#), and [statistics](#).

## 3.1 System status

On the **System Status** page, you can view the system status here.

To access the page, log in to the web UI of the device, and choose **Status**.

In **AP** mode, **Client** mode, **Universal Repeater** mode, or **Client + AP** mode, the system status is shown as follows:

### Parameters description

Name	Description
Device Name	It specifies the name of this device.  A unique device name helps you manage multiple devices that are of the same model on LAN easily. To modify the device name, go to <b>Network &gt; LAN Setup</b> page. You are allowed to modify only when the device works in <b>AP</b> , <b>Client</b> , <b>Universal Repeater</b> , or <b>Client + AP</b> mode.
Uptime	It specifies the time that has elapsed since the device was started last time.
System Time	It specifies the current system time of this device.
Hardware Version	It specifies the hardware version number of this device.

Name	Description
RAM	Random Access Memory. It specifies the memory usage of this device.
WLAN MAC Address	It specifies the MAC address of the WiFi network of this device.
PoE LAN/LAN Speed	It specifies connection status of LAN port. It includes connection rate and duplex mode.
LAN IP Address	It specifies the IP address (also called login or management IP address) of this device. By default, it is <b>192.168.0.254</b> .
Firmware Version	It specifies the system software version number of this device.
CPU	Central Processing Unit. It specifies the CPU usage of this device.
LAN MAC Address	It specifies the MAC address of LAN ports of this device.

Name	Description
Connection Type	It specifies the internet connection type of this device.
Connection Status	It specifies the connection status of WAN port of this device.
WAN IP Address	It specifies the IP address of WAN port of this device.
Default Gateway	It specifies the default gateway address of this device.
Primary DNS Server	It specifies the IP address of primary DNS server of this device.
Secondary DNS Server	It specifies the IP address of secondary DNS server of this device.



## 3.2 Wireless status

On the **Wireless Status** page, you can view wireless status here, including working mode, SSID, security mode, and so on.

To access the page, log in to the web UI of the device, and choose **Status**.

### Parameters description

Name	Description
Working Mode	It specifies the working mode the device operates.
SSID	It specifies the WiFi name of this device. In Client mode, it displays N/A.
Security Mode	It specifies the security mode of the WiFi network of this device.
Channel/Radio Band	It specifies the channel and frequency band the device operates.
Channel Bandwidth	It specifies the channel bandwidth of this device.
TX Power	It specifies the transmit power of this device.
AP's MAC Address	In <b>Client</b> , <b>Universal Repeater</b> , <b>WISP</b> or <b>Client + AP</b> modes, it displays the MAC address of peer AP to which this device bridged. In <b>AP</b> or <b>Router</b> mode, it displays <b>No Peer AP</b> if the device works.
Signal Strength	In <b>AP</b> or <b>Router</b> mode, it displays the signal strength of the first device connected to the WiFi network of the device. In <b>Client</b> , <b>Universal Repeater</b> , <b>WISP</b> or <b>Client + AP</b> mode, it displays the received signal strength from peer AP.
Background Noise	It specifies the strength of ambient radio interference. Larger absolute value indicates less interference. For example, -95 dBm indicates less interference than that of -75 dBm.

Transmit/Receive Speed	<p>It specifies the wireless transmitting/receiving rate.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• In <b>AP</b> or <b>Router</b> mode: it displays the transmitting/receiving rate of the first client connected to the WiFi network of this device.</li> <li>• In <b>Client</b>, <b>Universal Repeater</b>, <b>WISP</b> or <b>Client + AP</b> mode: it displays transmitting/receiving rate of this device.</li> </ul>
Wireless Client	It specifies the number of wireless clients connected to this device. In <b>Client</b> mode, it displays <b>N/A</b> .

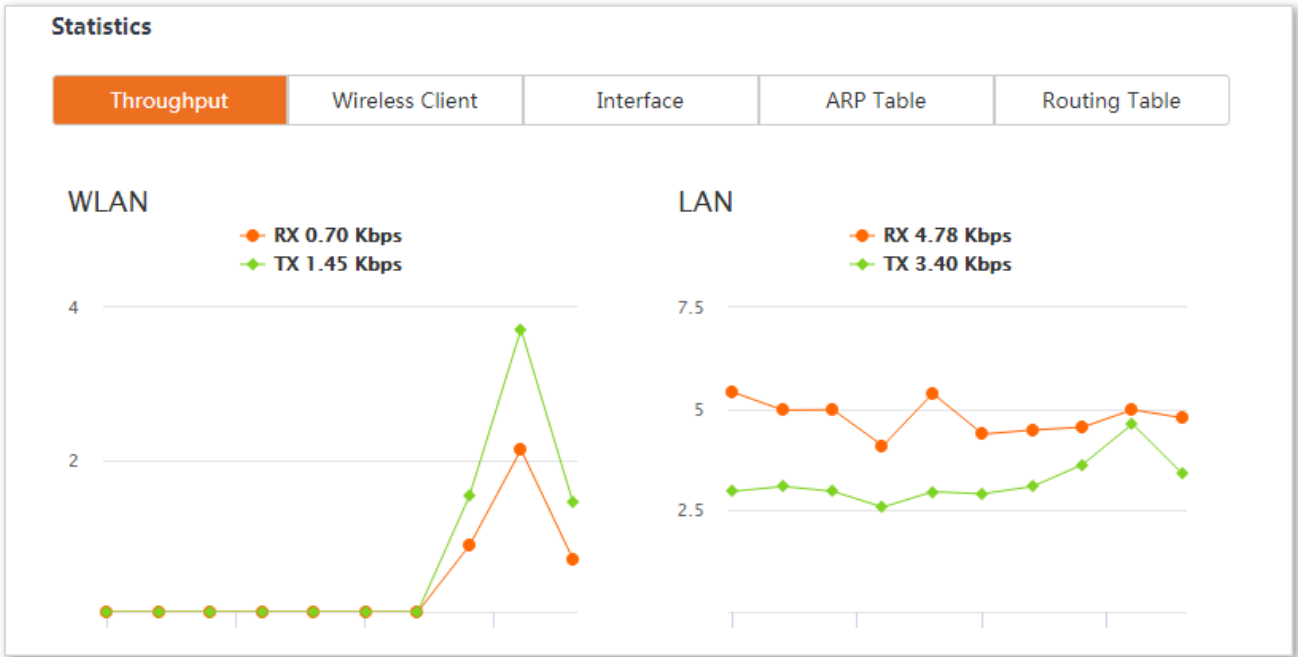
### 3.3 Statistics

On the **Statistics** page, you can view statistics information here, including [throughput](#), [wireless client](#), [interface](#), [ARP table](#) and [routing table](#).

To access the page, log in to the web UI of the device, and choose **Status**.

#### 3.3.1 Throughput

The line charts visually show the real-time transmitting and receiving traffic of WLAN and LAN ports of the device.



#### 3.3.2 Wireless client/Upstream AP

This module differs depending on the working mode of the device.

-In **AP** or **Router** mode, it displays information of connected wireless clients.

-In **Client**, **Universal Repeater**, **WISP** or **Client + AP** mode, it displays information of upstream AP.

IP Address	It specifies the IP address of the corresponding wireless client.
MAC Address	It specifies the MAC address of the corresponding wireless client.
Signal/Noise	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>Signal:</b> It specifies the WiFi signal strength of the corresponding wireless client.</li> <li>• <b>Noise:</b> It specifies the ambitus interference signal and electromagnetic interference strength.</li> </ul>
Transmit/Receive	It specifies the transmitting and receiving rate of the corresponding client.
CCQ	It specifies the connection quality of the corresponding client. Higher percentage indicates better connection quality.

MAC Address	It specifies the MAC address of the upstream device.
Signal/Noise	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>Signal:</b> It specifies the WiFi signal strength of the corresponding wireless client.</li> <li>• <b>Noise:</b> It specifies the ambitus interference signal and electromagnetic interference strength.</li> </ul>
Transmit/Receive	It specifies the transmitting and receiving rate of the upstream device.
CCQ	It specifies the connection quality of the upstream device. Higher percentage indicates better connection quality.
Connection Duration	It specifies the time that has elapsed since this device is connected to the upstream AP last time.

On It displays the IP address, MAC address and traffic information of the interfaces of the device.

#### Parameters description

Name	Description
Interface	It specifies the interface type that packets passes through, including LAN, Bridge, and WLAN interfaces.
IP Address	It displays the IP addresses of wired interface, bridge interface, and WLAN interface.
MAC Address	It displays the MAC addresses of an interface.
Received Packets	It displays the received and transmitted packets of the interface.
Transmitted Packets	
Receive Error	It displays the number of error packets received/transmitted by the interface.

### 3.3.4 ARP table

ARP (Address Resolution Protocol) is a network layer protocol used to convert an IP address into a physical address. The ARP table displays the IP address and its corresponding MAC address the device visits, and the interface the packets pass through.

Name	Description
IP Address	It specifies the IP address of the host in the APR table.
MAC Address	It specifies the MAC address corresponding to the IP address.
Interface	It specifies the interface used to communicate with the host, including LAN, WLAN and bridge interfaces.

### 3.3.5 Routing table

It specifies the destination networks that the device can access.

To access the page, log in to the web UI of the device, and choose **Status**, then **Routing Table** in **Statistics** part.

Name	Description
Destination Network	It specifies the IP address of the destination network.
Subnet Mask	It specifies the subnet mask of the destination network.
Next Hop	It specifies the IP address of entrance of the next hop route when the packets egress from the interface of the device. 0.0.0.0 indicates that the destination network is the network which is directly connected to the interface.
Interface	It specifies the interface that the packets egress.

# 4 Quick setup

This module enables you to quickly configure the device or change the working mode of the device to deploy your WiFi network.

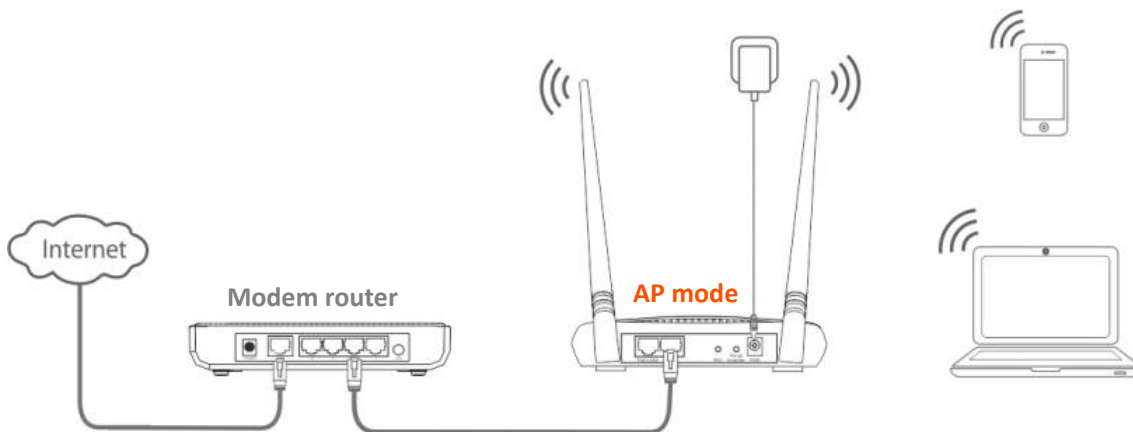
This AP supports [AP](#), [Client](#), [Universal Repeater](#), [WISP](#), [Client + AP](#), and [Router](#) modes.

## 4.1 AP mode

### 4.1.1 Overview

In **AP** mode, this device connects to a wired network, and provides a WiFi network for wireless clients.

**Network requirement:** You want to transform your wired network to a wireless one for your wireless devices to access the internet.



#### Configuration procedure of setting AP mode

**Step 1** [Log in to the web UI of the AP](#) and choose **Quick Setup** to enter the configuration page.

**Step 2** Select **AP** mode and click **Next**.

- AP** In this mode, the device creates a wireless network based on the current wired network.
- Client** In this mode, the device works as a wireless adapter to connect to the wireless network of upstream AP.
- Universal Repeater** In this mode, this device extends an existing wireless network for broader network coverage.
- WISP** In this mode, this device connects to an access point provided by ISP in wireless manner, and provides the wireless network.
- Client + AP** In this mode, the device extends an existing wireless network. You can customize the wireless network name and password of the extended wireless network.
- Router** connect to modem in wired manner, and provide network access point

Wait until the device completes rebooting to apply your settings.

Then connect your WiFi-enabled devices using the **SSID** (WiFi network name) and **Key** (WiFi password) you set and enjoy the internet access.



You can navigate to **Wireless > Basic** to view and modify the wireless information later.

Working modes	It specifies the working mode of this device. <b>AP mode:</b> In this mode, the device creates a WiFi network based on the current wired network.
SSID	It specifies the WiFi name of this device.
Channel	It specifies the operating channel of this device. <b>Auto (Default):</b> It indicates that the device automatically adjusts its operating channel according to the ambient environment.
Security Mode	It specifies the security mode of the WiFi network, including: <a href="#">None</a> , <a href="#">WPA-PSK</a> , <a href="#">WPA2-PSK</a> , and <a href="#">Mixed WPA/WPA2-PSK</a> .
Encryption	Clicking the hyperlink navigates you to the elaborated description of the corresponding security mode.
Encryption Algorithm	It specifies the encryption method of the WiFi network.
Encryption Mode	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• <b>AES:</b> It indicates the Advanced Encryption Standard.</li><li>• <b>TKIP:</b> It indicates the Temporal Key Integrity Protocol. If <b>TKIP</b> is used, the maximum wireless throughput of the AP is limited to 54 Mbps.</li><li>• <b>TKIP&amp;AES:</b> It indicates that both <b>TKIP</b> and <b>AES</b> encryption algorithms are supported. Wireless clients can connect to the WiFi network corresponding to the selected SSID using <b>TKIP</b> or <b>AES</b>.</li></ul>
Key	It specifies the WiFi password of the WiFi network.

## 4.1.2 Example of AP mode

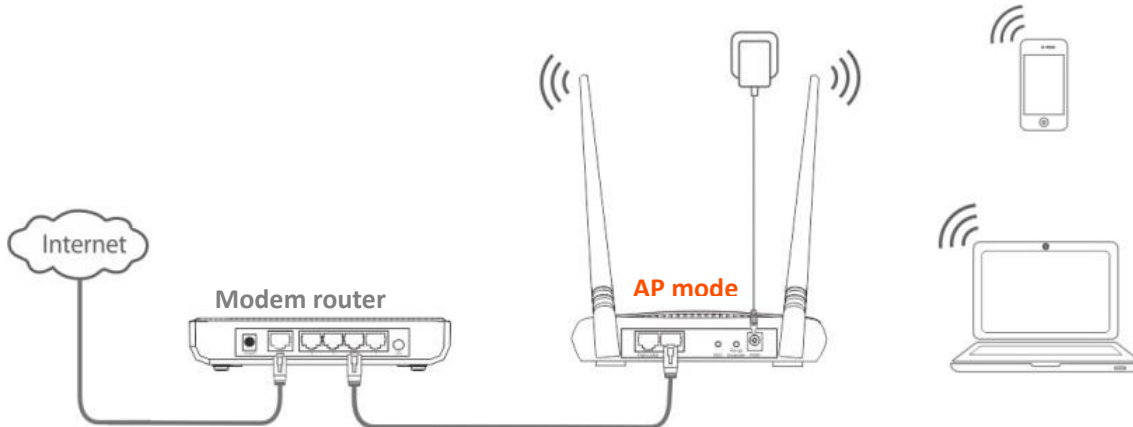
### Network requirement

You have several WiFi-enabled devices at your home, such as smart phones, tablets, smart speakers etc. But the modem router at your home can only provide internet access to wired devices. Now you want to establish a WiFi network for these wireless devices.

## Solution

To meet the requirement, you can set the device to **AP** mode to establish a WiFi network.

## Configuration procedure

**Step 1** [Log in to the web UI of the AP](#) and choose **Quick Setup** to enter the configuration page.

**Step 2** Select **AP**, and click **Next**.

### Quick Setup

Select a working mode:

- AP** In this mode, the device creates a wireless network based on the current wired network.
- Client** In this mode, the device works as a wireless adapter to connect to the wireless network of upstream AP.
- Universal Repeater** In this mode, this device extends an existing wireless network for broader network coverage.
- WISP** In this mode, this device connects to an access point provided by ISP in wireless manner, and provides the wireless network.
- Client + AP** In this mode, the device extends an existing wireless network. You can customize the wireless network name and password of the extended wireless network.
- Router** connect to modem in wired manner, and provide network access point

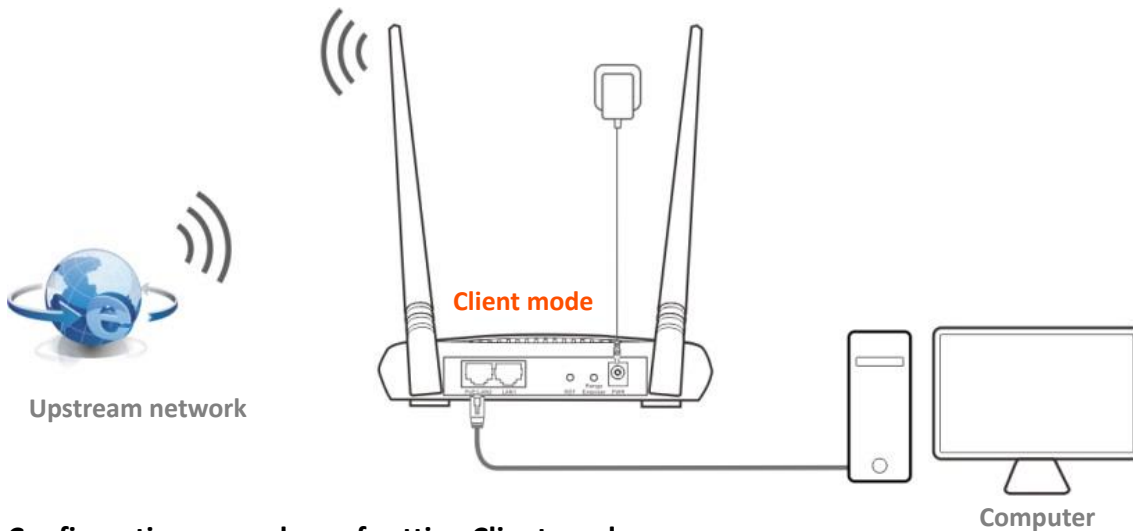

## 4.2 Client mode

### 4.2.1 Overview

In **Client** mode, this device serves as a wireless adapter, and connects wired devices to an upstream network.

**Network requirement:** You want to connect your wired devices to a WiFi network.



#### Configuration procedure of setting Client mode

**Step 1** [Log in to the web UI of AP](#) and choose **Quick Setup** to enter the configuration page.

**Step 2** Select **Client**, and click **Next**.

### Quick Setup

Select a working mode:

- AP In this mode, the device creates a wireless network based on the current wired network.
- Client In this mode, the device works as a wireless adapter to connect to the wireless network of upstream AP.
- Universal Repeater In this mode, this device extends an existing wireless network for broader network coverage.
- WISP In this mode, this device connects to an access point provided by ISP in wireless manner, and provides the wireless network.
- Client + AP In this mode, the device extends an existing wireless network. You can customize the wireless network name and password of the extended wireless network.
- Router connect to modem in wired manner, and provide network access point

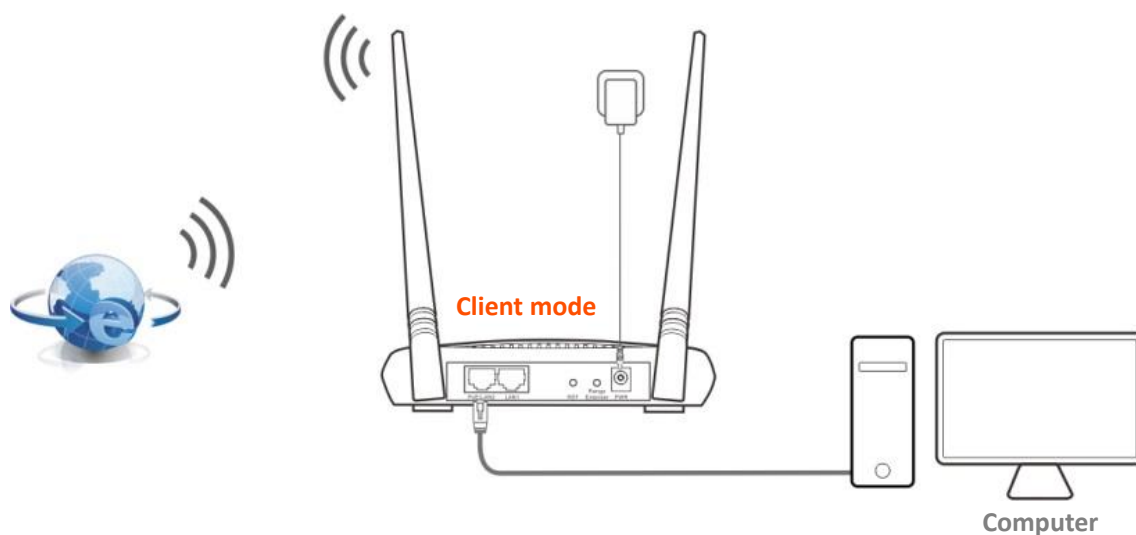

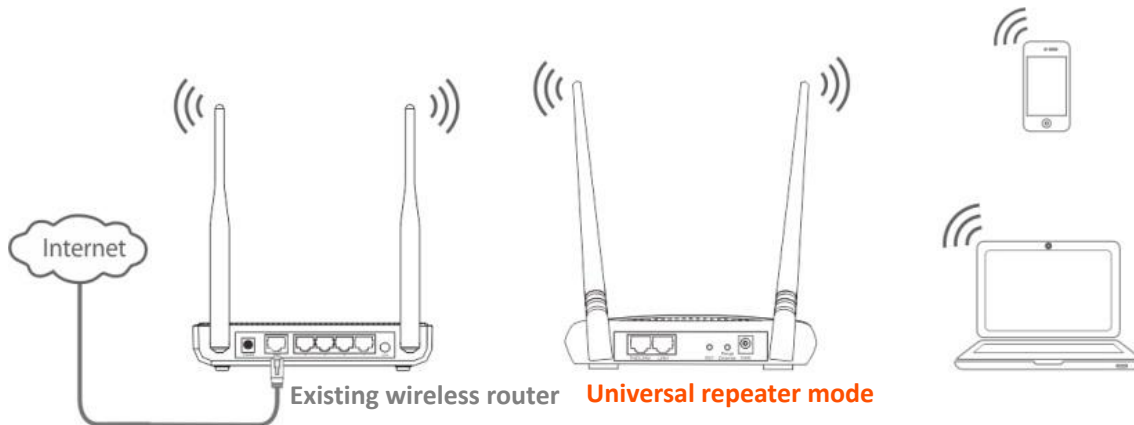

## 4.3 Universal repeater mode

### 5.1.1 Overview

On the **LAN Setup** page, you can view the MAC address of the LAN port, configure the device name, and type of obtaining an IP address and related parameters.

### 5.1.3 Logging in to the web UI after changing the LAN IP address

## 5.1.4 Setting the device to obtaining an LAN IP address automatically

This method applies to a large LAN network with a large number of APs. With this method, the device automatically obtains an IP address, a subnet mask, a gateway IP address, DNS server IP addresses assigned by the DHCP server of the upstream device.

## 5.2 MAC clone

This function is available only when the device works in **WISP** or **Router** mode.

### 5.2.1 Overview

If the device cannot access the internet after configuring internet settings, your ISP may have bound your internet service account with the MAC address of your computer that was used to verify the internet connectivity after you subscribed to the internet service. Therefore, only this computer can access the internet with the account.

In this case, you need to clone the MAC address of this computer to the WAN port of this device for internet access.

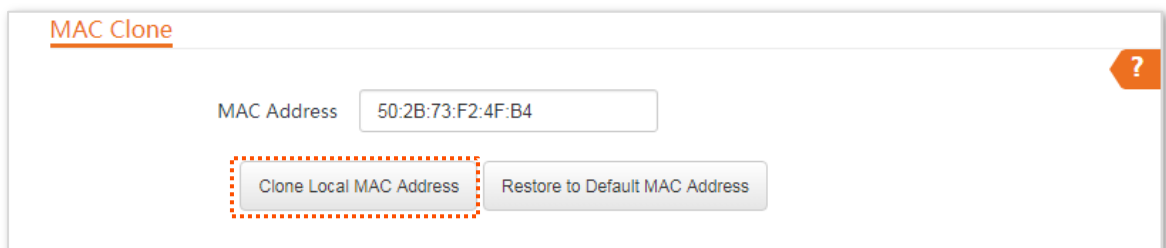



## 5.3 DHCP server

### 5.3.1 Overview

The device provides a DHCP server function to assign IP addresses to clients on the LAN. By default, the DHCP server function is disabled.



If the network segment of the device's LAN port changes, the network segment of the device's DHCP server pool changes accordingly.

## 5.5 VLAN settings

This function can be configured only when the device works in **AP** mode.

### 5.5.1 Overview

The device supports the IEEE 802.1Q VLAN function, so that it can be used in networks with QVLAN. By default, the function is disabled.

After the VLAN settings take effect, packets with tags are forwarded to the ports of the corresponding VLAN according to the VID of the packet, and packets without tag are forwarded to the ports of the corresponding VLAN according to the PVID of the port.

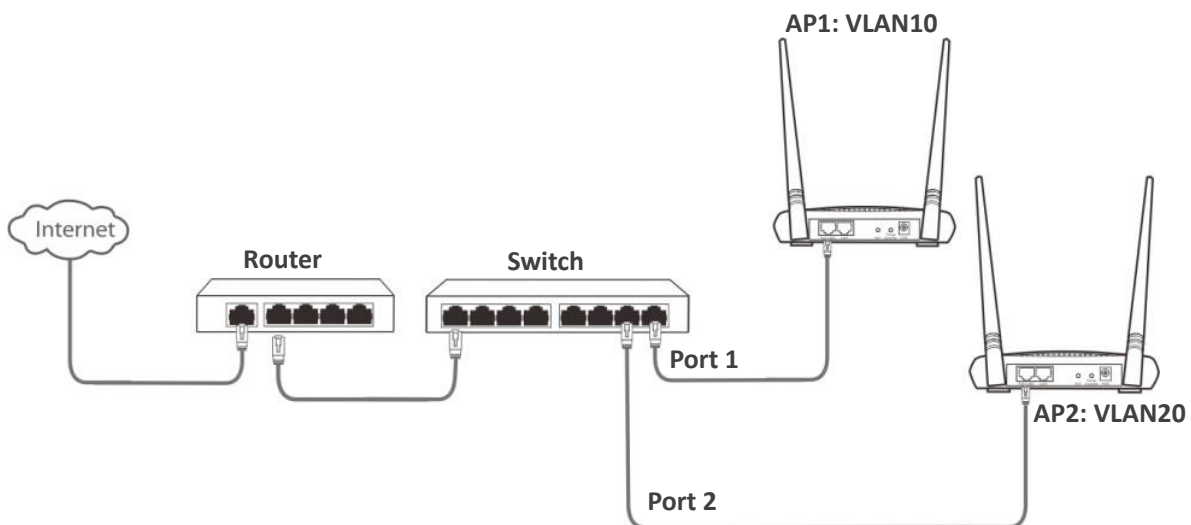

Data encrypted based on WEP can be easily cracked. In addition, WEP supports a maximum WiFi network throughput of only 54 Mbps. Therefore, this security mode is not recommended.</li> <li>• <b>WPA-PSK/WPA2-PSK/Mixed WPA/WPA2-PSK:</b> They belong to pre-shared key or personal key modes, where Mixed WPA/WPA2-PSK supports both WPA-PSK and WPA2-PSK.</li> </ul> <p>WPA-PSK, WPA2-PSK, and Mixed WPA/WPA2-PSK adopt a pre-shared key for authentication, while the AP generates another key for data encryption. This prevents the vulnerability caused by static WEP keys, and makes the three security modes suitable for ensuring security of home WiFi networks. Nevertheless, because the initial pre-shared key for authentication is manually set and all clients use the same key to connect to the same AP, the key may be disclosed unexpectedly. WPA and WPA2 use the root keys to replace the pre-shared keys that set manually, but adopt the same encryption process as WPA-PSK and WPA2-PSK.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>WPA/WPA2:</b> WPA and WPA2 uses 802.1x to authenticate clients and the login information of a client is managed by the client. This effectively reduces the probability of information leakage. In addition, each time a client connects to an AP that adopts the WPA or WPA2 security mode, the RADIUS server generates a data encryption key and assigns it to the client. This makes it difficult for attackers to obtain the key. These features of WPA and WPA2 help significantly increase network security, making WPA and WPA2 the preferred security modes of WiFi networks that require high security.</li> </ul>

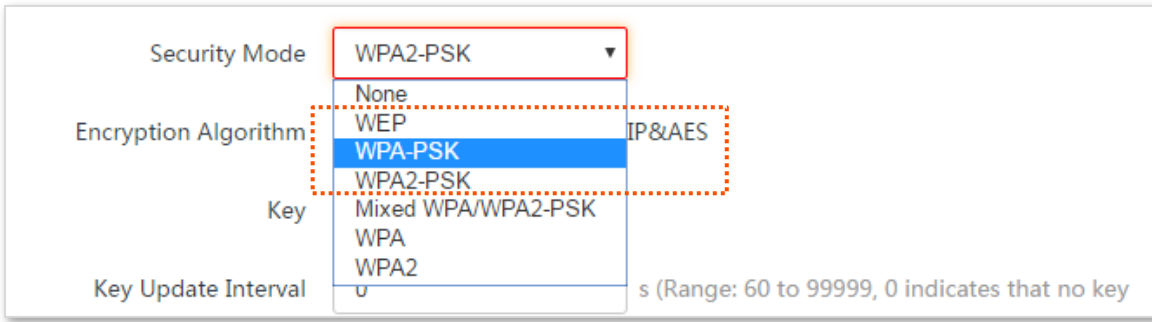

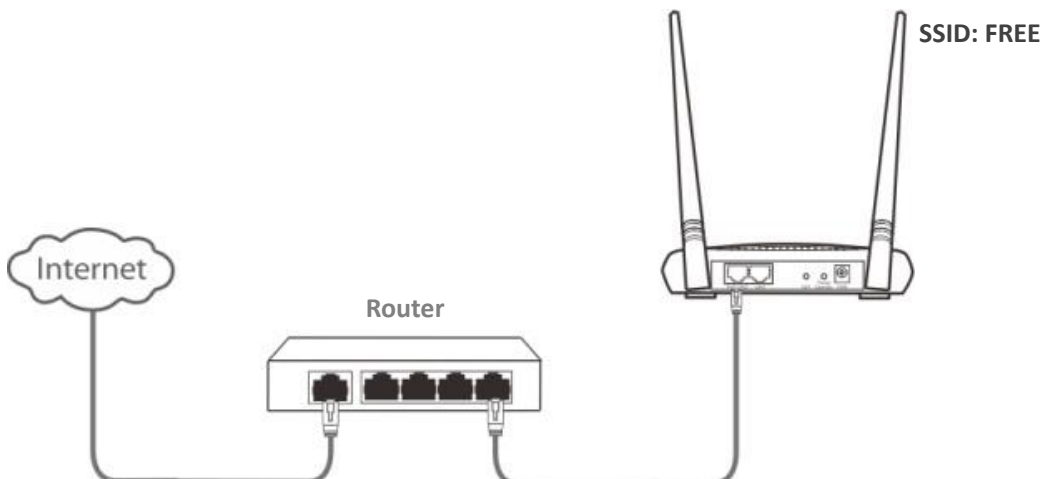

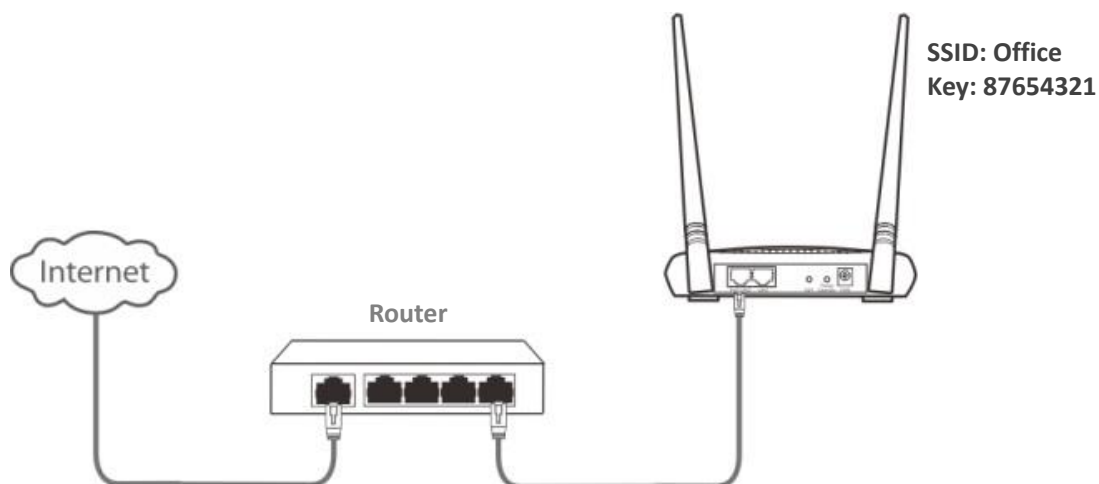

WMM	WMM (Wi-Fi Multi-media) is a wireless QoS protocol making packets with higher priorities are transmitted earlier. This ensures better QoS of voice and video applications over WiFi networks.



Name	Description
APSD	It specifies whether to enable the Automatic Power Save Delivery (APSD) mode. APSD is a WMM power saving protocol created by Wi-Fi Alliance. Enabling APSD helps reduce power consumption. By default, this mode is disabled.
Minimum RSSI Threshold	It specifies the minimum strength of received signals acceptable to this device. If the strength of the signals transmitted by a wireless device is weaker than this threshold, the wireless device cannot connect to this device. This mode improves the device's anti-interference capability.</li> </ul>

Fragment Threshold	It specifies the threshold of a fragment. The unit is byte. Fragmenting is a process that divides a frame into several fragments, which are transmitted and acknowledged separately. If the size of a frame exceeds this threshold, the frame is fragmented. In case of a high error rate, you can reduce the threshold to enable this device to resend only the fragments that have not been sent successfully, so as to increase the frame throughput. In an environment with little interference, you can increase the threshold to reduce the number of frames, so as to increase the frame throughput. Frame length threshold for triggering the RTS/CTS mechanism. If a frame exceeds this threshold, the RTS/CTS mechanism is triggered to reduce conflicts. The unit is byte. Set the RTS threshold based on the actual situation. An excessively small value increases the RTS frame transmission frequency and bandwidth requirement. A higher RTS frame transmission frequency enables a WiFi network to recover from conflicts quicker. For a WiFi network with high user density, you can reduce this threshold for reducing conflicts. The RTS mechanism requires some network bandwidth. Therefore, it is triggered only when frames exceed this threshold.

RTS Threshold	It specifies the frame length threshold for triggering the RTS/CTS mechanism. If a frame exceeds this threshold, the RTS/CTS mechanism is triggered to reduce conflicts. The unit is byte. Set the RTS threshold based on the actual situation. An excessively small value increases the RTS frame transmission frequency and bandwidth requirement. A higher RTS frame transmission frequency enables a WiFi network to recover from conflicts quicker. For a WiFi network with high user density, you can reduce this threshold for reducing conflicts. The RTS mechanism requires some network bandwidth. Therefore, it is triggered only when frames exceed this threshold.
DTIM Interval	It specifies the countdown before this device transmits broadcast and multicast frames in its cache. The unit is Beacon interval. For example, if DTIM Interval is set to 1, this device transmits all cached frames at one Beacon interval.

## 6.3 Access control

### 6.3.1 Overview

The device allows you to set whitelist (allow to access the internet) or blacklist (disallow to access the internet) based on wireless clients' MAC addresses.

### 6.3.2 Configuring access control

**Step 1** [Log into the web UI of the device](#), and choose **Wireless > Access Control**.

**Step 2** Select a SSID to which the rule applies.

**Step 3** Enable the **Access Control** function.

**Step 4** Select a MAC address filter mode, **Disallow** or **Allow**.

**Step 5** Add the client to be controlled.

- Manual enter: Enter the MAC address of the client in the **MAC Address** input box, and click **Add**.
- Quick add: Click **Add online devices** to add all connected clients to the access control list quickly.


# 7 Advanced

## 7.1 LAN rate

This module enables you to change LAN speed and duplex mode settings. If the transmission distance between the corresponding port of the AP and peer device is too long, you can reduce the port speed of the AP and peer device to increase the driving distance.

When you change the settings, ensure that the LAN speed and duplex mode of the port of the device is the same as that of peer device. By default, the LAN speed settings of the LAN port is **Auto Negotiation**.

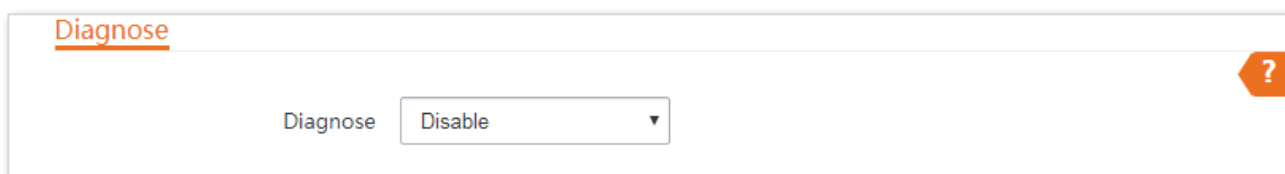
## 7.2 Diagnose

### 7.2.1 Overview

You can use the diagnosis tools for troubleshooting. The device supports the following 3 tools:

- **Site Survey:** used to check nearby wireless signals
- **Ping:** used to check the network connectivity and routes
- **Traceroute:** used to check the network routes

To access the page, choose **Advanced > Diagnose**.



### 7.2.2 Site Survey

Site survey gives you an insight into the information of nearby wireless signals. According to the diagnosis result, you can select a less interference channel (used by few devices) for the WiFi network of the device to improve the transmission efficiency.





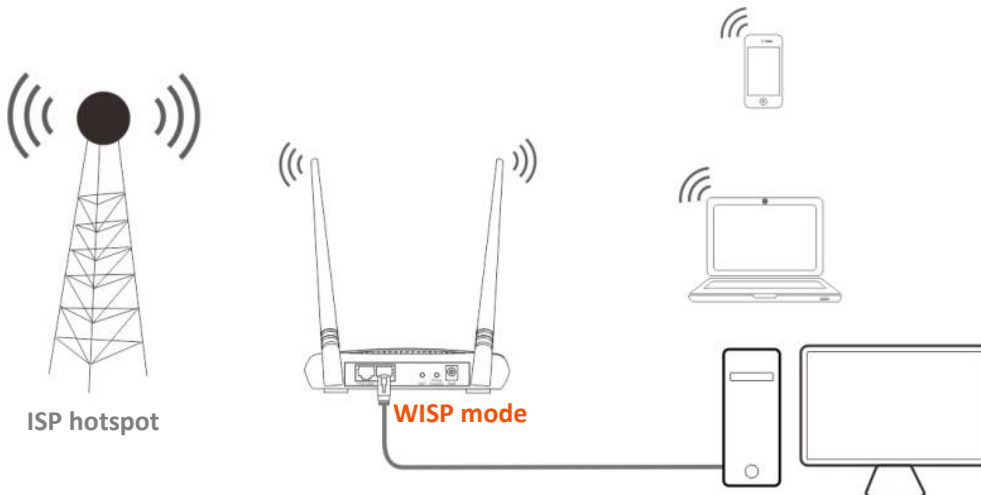

## 7.4 Port forwarding

This function is available only when the device works in **WISP** or **Router** mode.

### 7.4.1 Overview

If computers are connected to the router to form a LAN and access the internet through the router, internet users cannot access the hosts on the LAN. Therefore, the servers, such as web servers, email servers, and FTP servers, on the LAN are inaccessible to internet users. To enable internet users to access a LAN server, enable the port forwarding function of the router, and map one service port to the IP address of the LAN server. This enables the router to forward the requests arriving at the port from the internet to the LAN server, and avoid the attacks from the WAN.

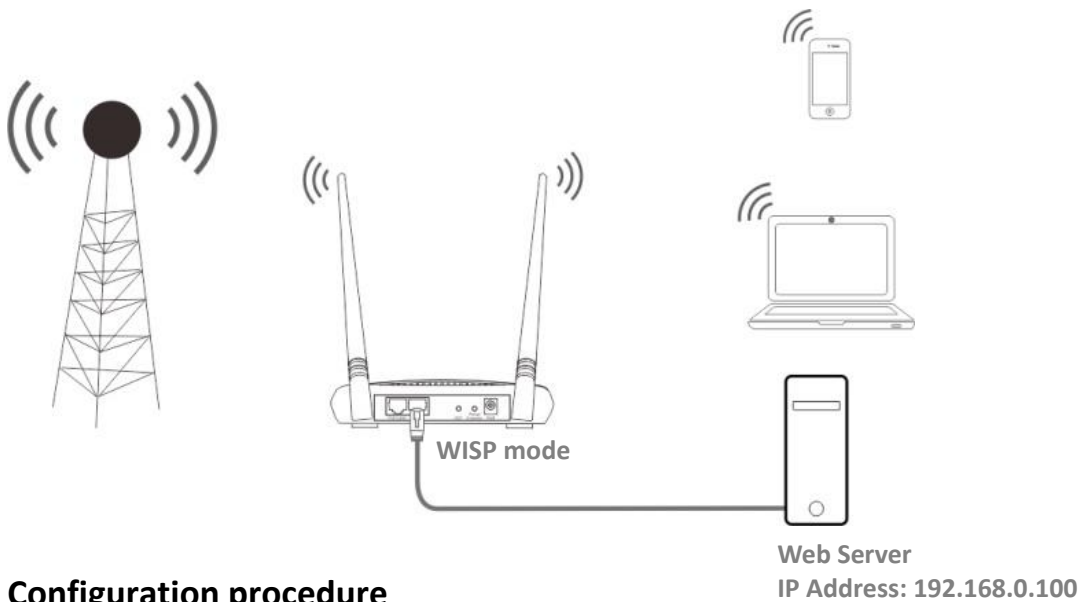



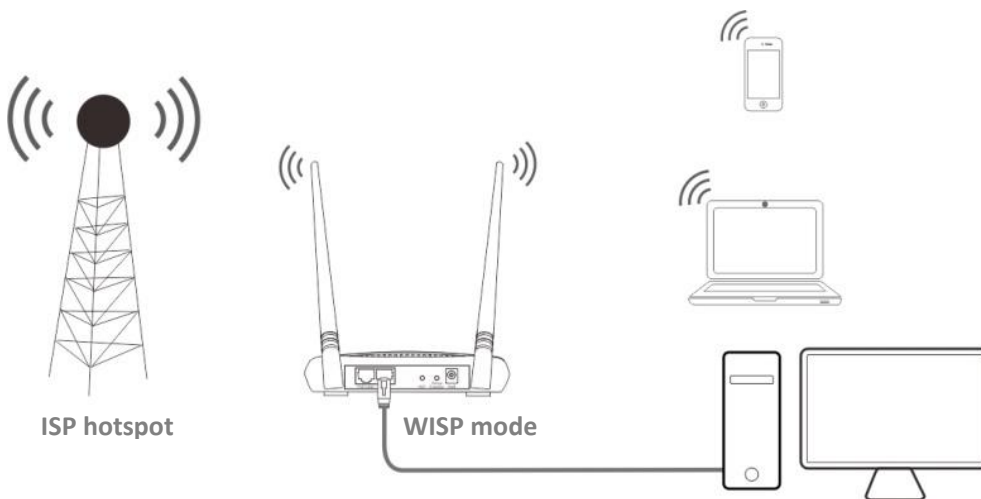

## 7.6 Network service

### 7.6.1 DDNS


This function is available only when the device works in **WISP** or **Router** mode.

DDNS, Dynamic Domain Name Server, enables the dynamic DNS client on the device to deliver the current WAN IP address to the DNS server. Then the server maps the WAN IP address to a domain name for dynamic domain name resolution.

This function often works with the port forwarding, DMZ host, and remote web management functions. Then users can visit an address with a domain name instead of a dynamic WAN IP address which makes the visit easier.

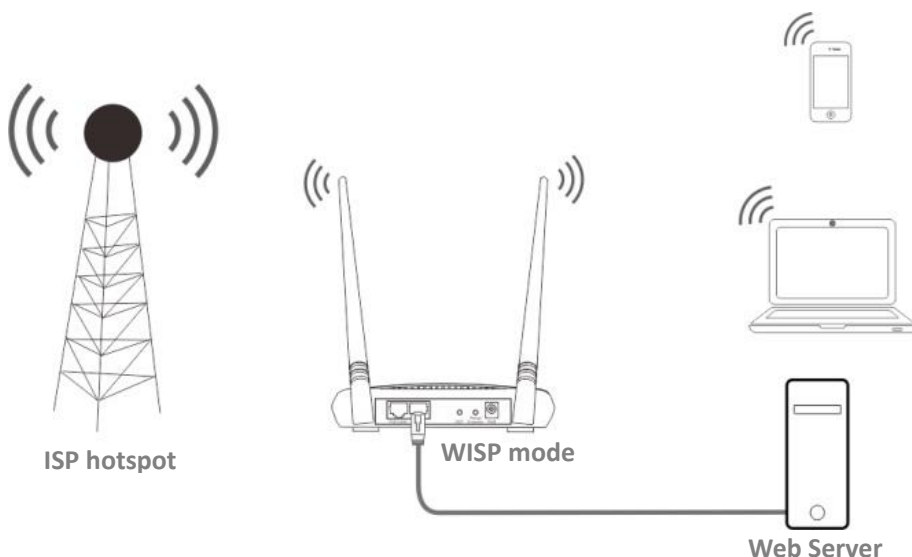

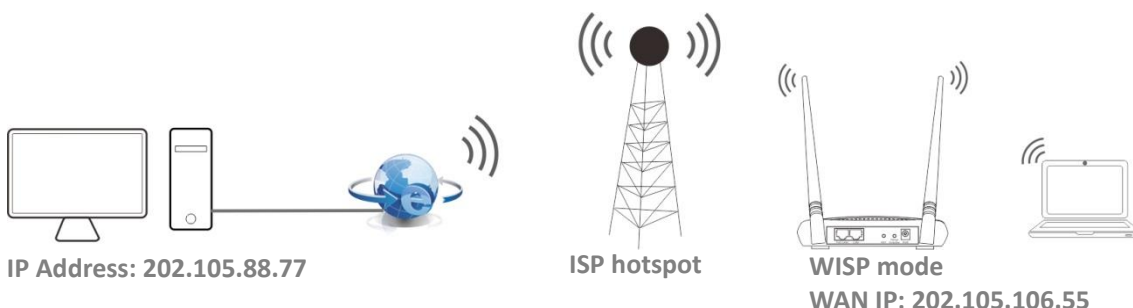





## 7.6.4 Login timeout interval

If you log in to the web UI of the device and perform no operation within the login timeout interval, the device logs you out for network security. The default login timeout interval is 5 minutes.

## 7.6.5 Ping watch dog



## 7.6.6 DMZ host

This function is available only when the device works in **WISP** or **Router** mode.

A DMZ host on a LAN can communicate with the internet without limit. You can set a computer that require higher internet connection throughput, such as a computer used for video conferencing or online gaming, as a DMZ host for better user experience.



- A computer set to DMZ host is not protected by the firewall of the device.
- A hacker may leverage the DMZ host to attack your LAN. Therefore, enable the DMZ function only when necessary.

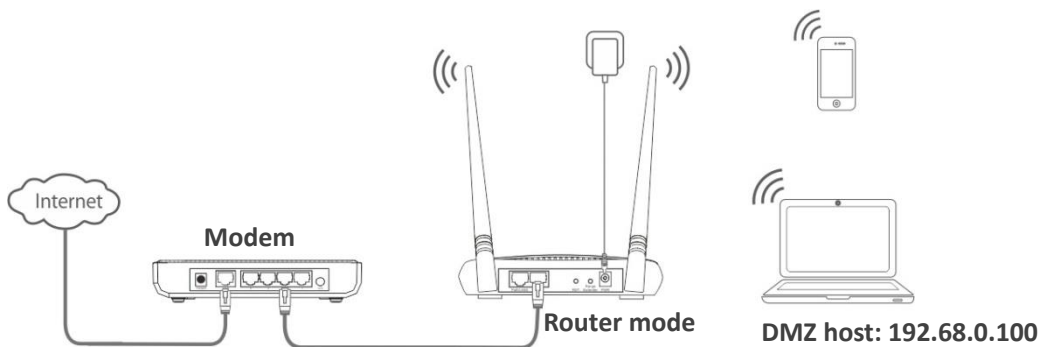

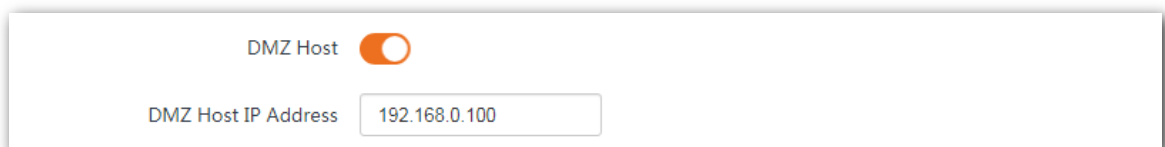


If the administrator still cannot visit the web server in LAN after the configuration, try the following solutions:

- Ensure that the WAN IP address is a public IP address. A private WAN IP address may invalidate the port forwarding function. Common IPv4 IP addresses include A, B, and C types: A type ranges from 10.0.0.0 to 10.255.255.255; B type ranges from 172.16.0.0 to 172.31.255.255; C type ranges from 192.168.0.0 to 192.168.255.255.
  - Try accessing **Protocol name://domain name:port number**
  - Security software, antivirus software, and the built-in OS firewall of the computer may cause port forwarding function failures. Disable them and try again.
  - Assign a static IP address to the DMZ host in case of service interrupt caused by the dynamic IP address.

### 7.6.7 Telnet service

With this function enabled, the device can be managed via Telnet. Generally this function is used to maintain the device by technical professional.

To access the page, choose **Advanced > Network Service**. By default, the function is disabled.

### 7.6.8 UPnP

Universal Plug and Play (UPnP) is a set of networking protocols that makes automatic port forwarding possible. It can identify devices and enable ports for certain applications, such as Thunder. To use this function, it requires that the operating system support UPnP, or application software supporting UPnP is installed.

To access the page, choose **Advanced > Network Service**. By default, the function is disabled. You can enable it as required.

## 7.6.9 Hardware watch dog

This function uses an embedded watchdog timer to detect the operation condition of the device's main program at scheduled time. During normal operation, the device regularly resets the watchdog timer to prevent it from elapsing, or "timing out". If, due to a hardware fault or program error, the device fails to reset the watchdog timer, the timer will elapse and generate a timeout signal. The timeout signal is used to reboot the device to make it recover from malfunctions.

To access the page, choose **Advanced** > **Network Service**. By default, the function is enabled.


## 8.1 Date & time

This module enables you to set the system time of the device.

Ensure that the system time of the device is correct, so that time-based functions can be executed correctly.

The device allows you to set the system time by synchronizing the time with the internet or manually setting the time. By default, it is configured to synchronize the system time with the internet.



## 8.2 Maintenance

If a setting does not take effect or the device works improperly, you can try rebooting the device to resolve the problem.

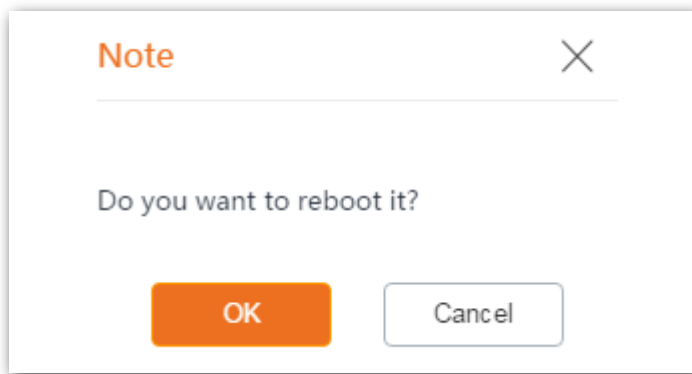

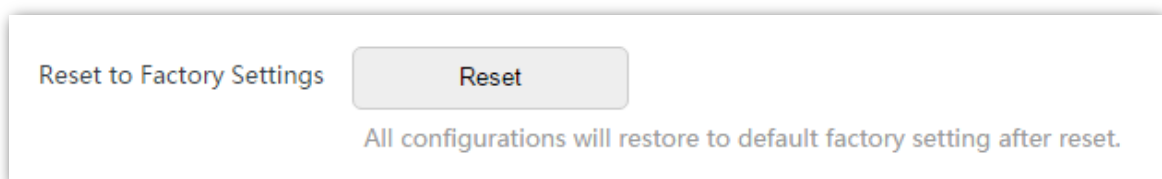

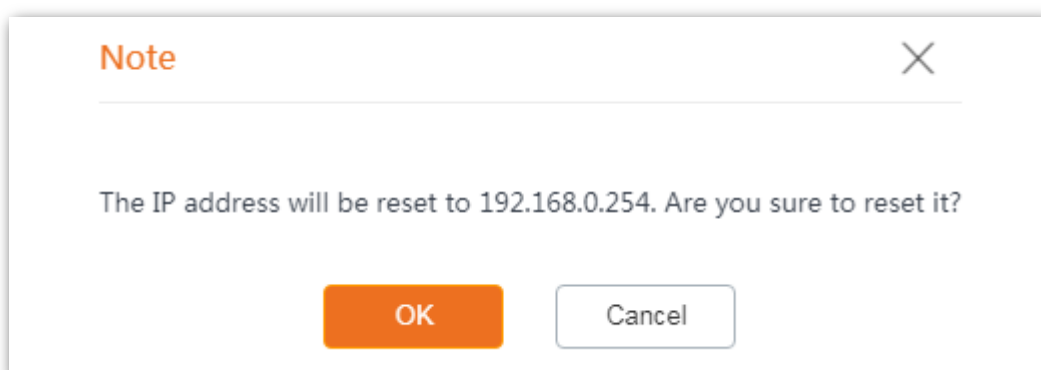

### 8.2.3 Upgrade firmware

## 8.4 System log

To access the page, choose **Tools > System Log**. The maximum of 300 items can be saved. After the total log items exceed the maximum number, the previous logs will be cleared.

The logs of the device record various events that occur and the operations that users perform after the device starts. In case of a system fault, you can refer to the logs during troubleshooting.

- When the device reboots, the previous logs are cleared.
- The device reboots when one of the following situations occurs: the device is powered on after a power failure, the VLAN function is configured, the firmware is upgraded, the configuration of the device is backed up or restored or the factory settings are restored.
